So much of what is learned through your participation in Lions, is a benefit to you as you interact in the many other areas of your life.


Get all of your club members engaged in this Forum. Your club and zone and the district will be so much better for it.



get back to our outdoor exercise routines. Maybe this year as we look at the beautiful areas around us, we can make a "New Spring Resolution" and promise to become more environmentally friendly.

Learning to be friendly to the environment is easier than you may think; start small to make changes easily and a part of your normal life. Here a just a few ideas to help you start thinking "green"

<u>Practice Conservation</u>: become aware of how natural resources are used in your life- turn off your lights, watch your water usage and what you put down your drains

<u>Plant trees</u>: trees are necessary for life- they give off oxygen, give fruit, clean the air and prevent soil erosion. Shady areas around your home in the summer

Conserve water: water takes a lot of energy to move from rivers and lakes into your home. Conserving water reduces the amount of energy needed to filter it.

Ways to conserve H20- take shorter showers, fix leaky pipes, use water saving appliances. How about collecting rainwater in a barrel to water your plants, wash your car, etc...

Reduce use of harmful chemicals: Paint, oil, ammonia and other chemical substances can seep into ground water/soil causing pollution and threats to human health. Dispose of them as directed on packaging

<u>Buy recycled products</u>: look for products that are made of recycled materials or are minimally packaged. Look to see if product was manufactured using plastics or chemicals

<u>Composting</u>: take the remains of plants and kitchen waste and convert it into nutrition for your plants or garden. Composting reduces the amount of garbage that goes to landfill which ends up polluting the air.

REMEMBER: THE # 3 R's of Waste Hierachy: REDUCE- REUSE- RECYCLE

PS: don't forget the week of April 17-23 is the "World-Wide Week of Service to Protect Our Planet"

- Choose 1st, 2nd, 3rd place winners award monetarily, and/or with certificates all participants should be given a participation certificate. It is your club's choice.

What will LYS do?

- Sell your club a contest kit for \$12.00 each.
- Photograph all participant's posters, frame them, and collect for display at Mid-Winter convention in January 2018. Original poster and a framed photo will be returned to participant.
- Guidance of each club's winner to be selected within their district by the District Governor.
- One winner from the two districts will be selected and guided through judging by the MCC.
- The MCC will select the final winner and sent it onto Lions International for judging. please note the winning original poster will not be returned to them
- LYS will have the winner's original poster photographed, enlarged, and framed and will be given in its place at the convention. The winner will also receive a monetary award during the convention.
