



Leadership Skills - Effective Listening

Why effective listening? Without it messages can be easily misunderstood which can lead to a communication breakdown. And a communication breakdown can lead to frustration and irritation – for both parties. The benefits of this skill are creating trustworthy relations that are transparent and promote loyalty and also inspiring growth and performance.

So how do you do it?

Pay attention Look at the speaker directly and avoid all distractions – internal and external.

Watch his/her body language.

Show that you are listening Smile, nod and keep yourself open and inviting.

Ask questions and encourage the speaker to expand his/her perspectives.

Do not judge Clear your mind of any preconceived notions.

Do not become complacent.

Be open to new ideas and ideals.

Do not interrupt Embrace a two-way communication.

Stay in the moment and be respectful.

Practice, practice, practice!

These are just a few ideas of how to be an effective listener. There are a number more, along with information about other leadership skills. As we enter the new year, I hope that as leaders and future leaders of your clubs that you take advantage of all the avenues available to further your knowledge of leadership





January is here and you may wonder what to do with your real Christmas tree- it seems such a shame to leave it abandoned by the side of the road with just the trash for company. Not only is it unsightly but dry needles can be FIRE HAZARD

Here are some great ideas for making better use of your tree:

- 1. Not too late to <u>MULCH</u>- use your pine needles to cover your strawberry beds- they dry quickly, decompose slowly, and provide moisture and mold free mulch for your bedding plants
- 2. <u>Create a Bird Sanctuary</u>-place your tree (in some type of stand) outdoors and hang your birdfeeders or coat pinecones with peanut butter for tasty treats
- 3. <u>Cut tree trunk</u> into 2 inch discs and set in soil to edge your flower beds or walkway (probably have to wait to Spring for this
- 4. **INSULATE** your perennials with branches to protect from snow and frost heaves

- 5. **SAW** your tree trunk into different lengths to use as flower pot holders (another Spring Project)
- 6. Using your saw again, cut thin slabs, sand until smooth and apply a thin coat of polyurethane for drink coasters or trivets (great gift idea for next year
- 7. Have a <u>CHIP PARTY</u>; rent a chipper, invite the neighbors and chip away- all can use in the Spring to suppress weeds
- 8. \ and add nutrients to your soil as the chips disintegrate.
- 9. <u>FEED</u> Your <u>Outdoor Fire Pit</u>- Needles and twigs dry out quickly, just in time for a winter bonfire. <u>Indoor Fireplaces</u>, use only logs that have completely dried out (several months).
- 10. **STRIP** your branches and use as stakes in your garden or use the smaller stripped twigs as support for your indoor plants
- 11. **FINALLY**, contact your community recycling program- they may pick up your tree for mulch and use in the community parks or as protective covering for the fish in the local ponds and lakes.



Onchocerciasis, also known as river blindness, is a parasitic disease that afflicts the rural poor. It is caused by a worm that is spread from person to person through the bites of Simulium black flies that breed in rapid-flowing rivers and streams. The disease can cause intense itching, eye damage, and irreversible blindness, reducing an individual's ability to work and learn. Worldwide, an estimated 120 million are at risk of being infected and 270,000 have been blinded by the disease, mostly in Africa.

Since 1993, Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) has awarded more than US\$33 million to support the distribution of river blindness medicine, Mectizan®, to approximately 251 million people in 15 African and Latin American countries. SightFirst has worked in close partnership since 1999 with The Carter Center—a leader in the fight to end river blindness.

On September 29, 2016, Guatemala's minister of health, Dr. Lucrecia Hernandez Mack, announced that the World Health Organization (WHO) has officially verified the elimination of onchocerciasis from Guatemala. Guatemala is now the fourth country in the Americas to be verified free of this disease, after Colombia (2013), Ecuador (2014), and Mexico (2015).
