



ENVIRONMENT

On August 21, 2017, the United States will see the sun disappear behind the moon. Daylight will turn to twilight, the temperature will drop rapidly, and massive streams of light will streak through the sky around the silhouette of the moon- America will be in the path of a total solar eclipse! Total eclipses occur when the disk of the moon appears to completely cover the disk of the sun

The path of totality for this eclipse is about 70 miles wide and residents in Oregon to South Carolina will be able to witness the total eclipse; the rest of us will experience varying degrees dependent upon your location (NH is estimated to get a 60% view; i.e. a "partial solar eclipse). The moon will cover the disk of the sun for 2 minutes and 40 seconds but if you are not directly in its path, the darkness will last a much shorter time (again dependent how far from the path you might be).

No matter where you are, there are precautions to take when viewing the eclipse; looking directly at the can cause serious eye damage or blindness. **NEVER look at a partial solar eclipse without proper eye protection and please don't forget your pets eyes**. For information about eclipses and what eye protection is needed visit www.space.com - there is a wealth of information on that site.

A couple of interesting facts:

- 1. This is the 1st total eclipse in the continental U.S. in 38 years-last one was 02/26/1979
- 2. A solar eclipse happens at the New Moon but not at every New Moon
- 3. 1st contact of the eclipse will be in Oregon at Government Point, OR at 10:15:56.5 AM. The end sighting of the eclipse on land will be just Southeast of Key Bay, SC.
- 4. Only one <u>large</u> city will have a great view- Nashville, TN- lasting 2+ minutes of totality; Boston will have 63% totality.
- 5. Only people in the total eclipse pathway will be able to view the true celestial spectacle: "the diamond ring".

It's Not Too Late to Prevent Type 2 Diabetes

More than 422 million people worldwide have diabetes, and this number is increasing in every country. Diabetes is a leading cause of blindness, amputations, kidney failure, heart attacks and stroke, and early death. The International Diabetes Federations estimates that by 2040 there will be more than 642 million living with the disease.

Did you know that as you get older, you have a greater chance of getting type 2 diabetes? It's true. You have a greater chance of getting diabetes if you are age 45 or older, are overweight or obese, or have a family history of diabetes.

You can take steps to prevent or delay getting type 2 diabetes. If you are overweight, losing a modest amount of weight can help. A modest weight loss for a 200-pound person who wants to prevent or delay type 2 diabetes is about 10 to 14 pounds.

Choose healthy foods. Eat more fruits and vegetables and fewer high-fat foods to help with weight loss.

Choose whole grain foods such as whole wheat bread, crackers, cereals, brown rice, oatmeal, and barley.

Choose fish, lean meat, chicken and turkey without skin.

Eat foods that have been baked, broiled, or grilled instead of fried.

Drink water instead of juice and regular soda.

Reduce portion sizes: Eat smaller amounts of food


Start now to get moving-and have fun: add more activity each day until you reach at least 30 minutes a day, 5 days a week.

Health Services Board - Stories to Warm Your Heart



Our first story comes from Lion Rosalie Smith from the Hopkinton Lions Club and OKS Coordinator for Zone 5 in District 44N. It has been edited for space reasons:

"The first year that the Zone started doing the vision screenings, we were eager to get started. We won over the superintendent and the school nurses to be able to do the screenings in the schools. We screened the elementary school and had average results. We then moved on to the middle school and did the 4th and 5th graders with similar results.

When we got to the 6th graders, they wanted to know how the SPOT worked and we showed them as we were doing the screenings. All went well. Then we got an unusual result from one student. The lead Lion screener knew enough about the results from the screening to express concern. Apparently the student had a significant degree of anisocoria (a response of the nervous system with possible indications of eye injury or disease).

We alerted the nurse who spoke to the student. She reported having occasional headaches and blurred vision but said they did not interfere with her regular activities. The nurse said she would follow up with the parents.

After checking back with the nurse over the next few weeks, we learned that the student had been taken to an opthamologist who determined that the child had an unrecognized benign tumor which was affecting her pupillary reflex. The student was successfully treated!"

Thanks go to the Lions who gave their time and talents to do the screening and the equipment that can find issues like this and change someone's life!!

OKS Screening tip of the month: If you do the same schools in your community every year, think about your club buying each school their very own USB stick to put all the student data on. That way you never have to take it out of the school!
