At the first of the year, you should look for candidates for next year's BOD. This will be your chance to get your people in place.

Ballots need to be formed and voted in by April. You might be asked to plan for the incoming installation.

Last, you will need to step up for the KL, if that person is unable to be in attendance for a meeting. When you look at this over ten months, it's easy to plan

Centennial Legacy Projects

Connecting Through Community

As Lions, we identify community needs and take action to meet those needs. If your club has not completed a Centennial Legacy Project, you have until June 30, 2018 to complete one. Level 1: Raise Your Community Visibility

Post new Lions signs

Donate a park bench, statue or fountain

Level 2: Provide a Community Gift Refurbish a park or playground

Fund Resources for the visually impaired

Donate a vehicle to a community organization

Level 3: Make a Community Impact

Build a clinic

Expand a library or school

Develop a training center

Inviting your community to help with a large-scale service project such as a legacy project is a great way to recruit volunteers who may become Lions. If your club has already completed a project, make sure you report it to MyLCI under the Community and Culture activity type. Clubs can earn a special banner patch. Your project may also qualify as a Centennial Service Challenge Project. More on that next month!

HUNGER RELIEF

I know everyone is aware that Lions Clubs International has taken on Hunger Relief as a major initiative as we move forward into our second hundred years. It is our responsibility as New Hampshire Lions to support this meaningful initiative.

What do you know about hunger in New Hampshire? If you are like me, probably not a lot, so let's start with some general knowledge. The largest food bank in NH is located in Manchester at 700 East Industrial Park Dr.

What is a Food Bank? According to their web site **nhfoodbank.org** A food Bank is the center of food collection and distribution in a community. In essence, foodbanks collect, sort and re-distribute food to the community. Traditionally, a food bank does not distribute food directly to those in need. Instead, food banks serve an extensive network of organizations in their respective communities. These organizations serve one part of the community and know the needs of the people there.

Bottom line is that the Food Bank helps supply your local Food Pantry. <u>For a list of the Food Pantries</u> in our state just go to **foodpan**<u>tries.org</u>. I'm sure your local food pantry would be thrilled to hear that you want to support them by having a food drive.

Anyone interested in helping out at camp this fall, we have lots of brush to cut, and painting which can be done any day any time. Just drop me a line and we can make arrangements.



<u>Bees</u>: Spoke about Bees and pollinators in the June newsletter; lots can be done to help them <u>Global Warming, Climate Change</u>: Check out the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative <u>Clean Water</u>: One of the most pressing issues in NH <u>Air Quality</u>: caused by both human factors and environmental factors

All of these concerns may seem impossible to solve, but if little steps are taken by individuals and groups, then progress in getting solutions will come in leaps and bounds...

Lions International has an online pamphlet, "<u>Green Team Caring for the Environment</u>", which gives excellent ideas for environmental projects that your club could implement over the coming year. You will find ideas in the following areas: Community Clean-up projects, Tree Planting projects, recycling Projects and Education projects. In the future I will try to give clubs more specific information on each of the above.

THE PROCESS:




