Here are some additional facts about Childhood Cancer from Lions Clubs International:

CHILDHOOD CANCER FACTS

- 2 minutes a child is diagnosed with cancer every two minutes
- 13% increase in incidence of childhood cancer over the last 20 years
- 6 years average age at diagnosis of children with cancer >90% of childhood cancer deaths occur in low resource settings

Keep looking for ways to reach out to families dealing with childhood cancer. Watch the local news, there at times stories about families dealing with cancer that are looking for help and read your local newspaper. Talk to local organizations like the Salvation Army, and schools. If you have other places your club has worked with, let me know so I can share it with the District.

I am betting that most of you have noticed the electric bill going higher and higher each month despite your efforts to reduce costs. Well, Camp Pride Camp Pride has - and they are in the process of doing something about it! This year, the Camp replaced the lighting in the Dining Hall and Binns Building with LED Lights; estimated savings of 50-60% from the current bill. Efforts are being made to convert the rest of the camp with the Moultonborough Lions leading the charge-they have paid for new LED lights in their adopted Pelham Building.

You might ask why LED Lights- they are more expensive than the current bulbs, i.e. halogen, fluorescent and incandescent. First of all, LED bulbs last up to 50,000 hours, fit most light fixtures, and will cut your energy use considerably. Secondly, your home lighting has proven to have an impact on your mental performance and the ability to complete a given task. Accent lighting impacts your moods and perception of a space's size and colors within that space. New LED lights are now available with excellent color quality with a variety of light outputs- they are also easy to install...

The recommendation is to replace incandescent and halogen bulbs with LEDs, the latest and best of all lighting technology- highly durable, they can outlast current bulbs by years and, best of all, save you money. 


Building a balanced meal

Cornerstones4Care

A great way to build a healthy meal!

Sometimes it's hard to know where to start when you're trying to plan healthy meals. The American Diabetes Association's Create Your Plate guide makes it easy to create a balanced meal.





Here's how to do it:

Divide your plate

Draw an imaginary line down the middle of your plate. Then divide 1 of the sections in half. You should now have 3 sections on your plate—1 large and 2 small.

Start with vegetables

Fill the largest section with vegetables that are not starchy. Those could include, for example:

- Asparagus
- Green beans
- Spinach

- Broccoli
- Kale
- Zucchini

- Cauliflower
- Lettuce
- Celery
- Mushrooms

Next, it's starches and grains

In 1 of the small sections, add some grains and starchy foods. Those could include, for example:

- · Beans (black, lima, pinto)
- Bread
- Lentils

Potatoes

Quinoa

Corn

Green peas

- Pasta
- RiceTortillas

■ Then, put in the protein

In the other small section, add your protein. Maybe you'd like:

- Catfish
- Low-fat cheese
- Tuna

- Chicken
- Salmon
- Turkey

- Eggs
- Tofu

Fill in with fruit and dairy

Add a serving of fruit or a serving of dairy, or both, as your meal plan allows.

Drink up!

To top off your meals, add a low-calorie drink, like water, unsweetened iced tea, or unsweetened coffee.

Fats may be fine

If you're not sure whether fats are okay on your meal plan, talk with your dietitian or diabetes care team. Then, add in healthy fats, such as avocado or nuts, in small amounts. For cooking, use oils. For salads, try adding nuts, seeds, and vinaigrettes.

It's time to dig in to a healthy meal!



- 1. Learn to lead several generations. Focus on creating an environment where each age group feels valued and motivated to give their best effort. Remember most of the generational stereotypes you read online don't have much, if any, basis in fact.
- 2. Time to pick up the pace. We live in a world of instant gratification. We can develop services that gratify all members of our club. For leaders, ensuring that "picking up the pace" doesn't lead to a decline in the quality of the club will be crucial.
- 3. Emphasize accountability. As a service organization leader, you need to lead the charge by consistently holding yourself and those on your team accountable to a set of standards and values.
- 4. Embrace continuing education of leadership skill sets.
- 5. Mentoring and coaching. It is astounding to see coaching and mentoring rated as most effective modes of leadership development, yet still see them so widely under-used.
- 6. The art of communication... skills and knowledge. Truly effective reinforcement isn't reminding or retraining—it's providing the right information at the right time to encourage participants to apply, deepen, or reinforce or convey our purpose.

We have expanded our seminars to include those educators and motivational persons outside of our organization to help continue our Forum quest of creating better leaders. And in the long run, this helps expand the outside knowledge of what we do as Lions.






