

Thoughts on Vision

Tips for safe vision this summer

With the warmer temperatures and increased outdoor activities of summer, comes a rise in eye injuries. Below are eye injuries and ailments that Mass. Eye and Ear, the only dedicated eye emergency room in New England, sees most during the summer. Take a look at some of the most common eye injuries and tips to stay safe while also having fun!

Sunlight-Related Eye Ailments

Protect your eyes in the sunlight with sunglasses, (polarized lenses are more ideal), especially if you are on or near the water. The reflection can make the glare from UV rays worse.

Swimming with Contact Lenses

Roughly 45 million Americans wear contact lenses, and some contact lens users may be tempted to jump into a pool or cool off at a water park on a hot summer day. Swimming while wearing contact lenses can result in serious eye infections that may cause corneal ulcers and could lead to vision loss.

Yard Work-Related Injuries

Summer can be a great time to revisit that yard work or woodworking project you've been putting off all winter, but it also means an additional risk to your eyes.

Whether you're grinding metal in the garage working on your car, pulling out fence posts or planting in the garden, always wear eye protection. The experts recommend safety glasses with shatterproof lenses.

What should you do if you experience an eye injury?

The experts note that if you suspect you have an eye injury, you should seek care from an emergency room staffed with ophthalmologists. Be sure to get treated as soon as possible if you experience an eye injury, as there is potential for vision loss.

FLIP FLOPS! Everyone's favorite summer accessory! Back in the day, they weren't worn everywhere like now- they were "shower shoes" to be worn only at the beach, pool and the dormitory shower.

History shows us that a version of flip flops (made of leather) were worn by the early Egyptians in 1,500 BC and continue to be the shoe of choice (called by different names) for millions of people in many Asian and African Countries. In countless poor areas, these are the only shoes available to them. Our modern version of the flip flop is believed to be inspired by the Japanese "zori" which was brought to America by the US Soldiers serving in World War II.

Flip flops may seem like harmless adornments for out summer outfits but they are killing marine life. "Nine million tons of the popular footwear are washing up on the east African coast, mostly from Asia, India, China and Kenya.*" Problems have arisen because the dollar store versions, which are cheap to manufacture but break and wear out easily, are frequently discarded - winding up in landfills, beaches and oceans. Unfortunately, these low cost versions are made of materials that are not earth or animal friendly (plastic, certain types of foam, etc.).

So how can we reduce the impact on the environment? Well, the next time you need to replace your flip flops, resist the urge to buy the cheaper versions and invest in a higher quality that will not only last longer but will probably save you money in the long run. There are several shoe manufacturers out there who have taken this cause to heart and are manufacturing environmental friendly styles made of natural materials; i.e. recycled plastic, upcycled tires, cork, hemp, natural rubber, recycled polyester and upcycled industrial hoses.

When your old flip flops are no longer suitable, <u>you</u> can investigate/look on-line for recycling centers (TerraCycle for one) or community groups that will send their collections to recycling organizations. You might also look on-line for ideas on how <u>you</u> can recycle; how about knee pads for gardening, gripper pads for furniture, DIY rubber stamps, door stops, and, of course, endless craft projects.

So enjoy your summer whether on vacation, bumming around town, or only walking to the pool- just be sure to take good care of those iconic symbols of summertime fun!

Additional Risk Factors for Diabetes

In addition to the factors scored in the Risk Test, race or ethnic background can play a role: type diabetes is more common in African Americans, Hispanics/Latinos, American Indians, and Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders.

Higher body weights increase diabetes risk for everyone. Asian Americans are at increased diabetes risk at lower body weights than the res of the general public (about 15 pounds lower).

Symptoms of Diabetes

People with type 2 diabetes often have no symptoms. When symptoms appear, they often include:

- Frequent urination
- Being very thirsty
- Tingling, pain, or numbness in the hands or feet
- Blurry vision

Problems Related to Diabetes

Diabetes can lead to other serious health problems such as:

- Heart disease and stroke
- Kidney problems
- Foot problems (ulcers and amputation)
- Nerve damage
- Eye problems and blindness

Please follow these guidelines when instructing participants how to sign cards. These guidelines will help to assure that all cards are acceptable to the United States Postal Service for shipping and to the military.

- 1. Please address the card to "Dear Warrior"
- 2. Write a holiday greeting, keeping in mind that our Troops are diverse in their holiday practices and beliefs.
- 3. Write a personal note. For example: How do you celebrate the holidays? What are your family memories of holidays? The Troops enjoy learning about things that happen in your hometown or region of the Country. The messages can be serious or funny or both, always keeping in mind that appropriate language and wording are important!
- 4. Sign your first name ONLY and the town and state where you live.
- 5. If you are or have been in the Military, please consider including that information. If you are a member of a club such as Lions or Rotary Groups, please consider including that information. If you are an elected official or a First Responder, please consider including that information in your Card.
- 6. If your card is homemade, please keep the size to no larger than an 8 x 11 size paper folded in half.
- 7. If you have an envelope, please do NOT seal it and there is no need to address the outside of the envelope. If you want to do so, please consider writing Warrior on the outside of the envelope. Feel free to decorate the envelope if you want to do so. Do not be concerned if you do not have an envelope!
