
Notes from Cabinet Secretary Valencia

A letter to All Lions from President Choi Regarding the Proposed Dues Increase

Dear Lions of MD44:

Lions Clubs International supports clubs and members around the world so we can advance our global mission of service together. Our international support and the work of Lions Clubs International is fueled by the international dues of our incredible members.

At the International Board of Directors meeting in October, the Board voted to approve an international dues adjustment resolution that will be voted on at the International Convention in Singapore in 2020.

In recent years, it has become increasingly clear that the services Lions Clubs International has been able to provide to members with the available budget is no longer in line with what Lions need and expect.

The Board of Directors undertook an extensive review of Lions Clubs International's financials, including the implementation of substantial budget reductions. After much consideration, the board proposed to adjust dues by US\$3 effective July 2021, raising dues to US\$46, then adjusted annually for U.S. inflation thereafter. We will use a three-year inflation average not to exceed 3.0% or be lower than 1.5%.

Why an international dues adjustment is needed

We realize the association has been reluctant to adjust dues over the years, and we have not adjusted international dues since 2011. The proposed adjustment will help cover our costs and allow us to suitably serve our members' needs. With that said, the Board of Directors did not take this issue lightly, nor are we minimizing the value of each dollar that our members contribute.

As we consider this dues adjustment, it is essential that we keep in mind that our global efforts and initiatives support more than 1.4 million members in 48,000 clubs around the world. Through the support of staff, we are able to serve globally on the level that we do, keeping members and clubs fully supported with service resources, training events and software, club operational support, international meetings, language services, technology, Foundation support, leadership support, and everything else we have come to expect as Lions.

A dues adjustment will allow Lions Clubs International to provide improved support to Lions and continue to invest in improving programs and digital products like our website and MyLion. It will also allow us to invest in new programs such as the Learning Management System (LMS), development of new curriculum such as digital literacy, training videos, global advertising, marketing automation, digital and video storytelling and others tools and initiatives that will enhance our impact, our brand and our membership.

Why your help is needed

Essentially, we have to decide whether or not we want Lions Clubs International to continue to grow and thrive. Lions is more than a way of life. It's also an investment of money, time, energy and passion. As with any good investment, the more we put in, the more returns we see.

Hello fellow Lions! First, I'd like to wish all Lions in Lions' land happy holidays. I'd like to report that my home club, the Atkinson Lions in partnership with the Salem Lions held our 2nd annual Diabetes A1C clinic at the Atkinson Community Center on Wednesday, November 13th. November happens to be National Diabetes month and the 14th is World Diabetes day in celebration of the birthday of the man who invented insulin. We were fortunate to have 1VDG Marie Hall at the event along with two other RN's to test the Public on their A1C levels which is a measure of longer term blood glucose. Levels higher than 5.7% can indicate pre-Diabetes or Diabetes and folks who tested this high were referred to their Primary Care Doctors or other Medical facilities. A Nutritionist also volunteered to come in and talk about the importance of nutrition. And, we also had Pinnacle Therapy come in and talk to people about the importance of exercise. As we know, a major theme of Lions International is Diabetes as uncontrolled Diabetes can affect sight and many other functions within the body. If any club would like to talk about how we organized this Diabetes A1C event, please give me a call.

Note from PCC Celeste Ricupero, Diabetes Chair: Approximately 1.2 American adults and children have Type 1 Diabetes. Type 1 prevalence figure calculated from prevalence data from the CDC's SEARCH for Diabetes in Youth study and from data in the National Diabetes Statistics Report showing that type 1 diabetes represents 5% of diagnosed diabetes. Thank you to the Atkinson & Salem Lions Clubs for sponsoring a diabetes clinic on Nov. 13. The testing of glucose levels can make a world of difference to a person who is unaware that their level is high.

Thoughts on Vision

I'm not sure about you, but for me, despite being a lifelong New Englander, this cold snap is drying my skin and eyes. I'm sharing some winter vision tips from Mass. Eye and Ear Ophthalmologist, Ryan Vassan, MD.

Indoors or out, cold weather can be harsh on your eyes. We also tend to spend more time inside with the heat on which can cause dry skin, mouth, nose and eyes.

Both dry, irritated eyes and watering eyes can be annoying and uncomfortable. Here are some tips to help prevent them:

Use lubricating drops, such as artificial tears. Over-the-counter medications with a preservative can be used up to four times a day. Contact lens wearers should look for preservative-free drops or drops labeled for use by contact lens wearers.

Blink more often. Blinking provides moisture to your eyes. We tend to blink about half as frequently when we're watching TV or staring at a computer screen, so taking breaks is recommended.

Place a humidifier in your bedroom. It's the place where you spend a lot of time. If you increase humidity in just one place effectively, you'll get a big benefit."

Wear sunglasses outdoors. "Bigger is better because it will help limit your exposure to the cold, windy air," Dr. Vassan says. He also recommends choosing sunglasses that offer 100 percent ultraviolet protection and have polarized lenses, which help reduce glare from snow or water.

This month's article is a reappearance from last year's December article; I felt it was worth repeating as the Holiday season approaches...

Wrappings and your recycle bin: MOST of your Christmas and other wrappings are NOT recyclable and should go directly into your trash collections!

NO-NOs include:

BOWS: most are made of a plastic/paper composite and that does not even include the glue for adherence WRAPPING PAPER: Paper with metallic, glitter or velvety flocking cannot be recycled. Non-laminated plain paper is totally recyclable. To test if recyclable, crush wrapping into a ball, if it stays bundled up, it can be recycled.

GIFT BAGS: are nice as they can be reused (so don't feel guilty if you do- you are saving the landfill...)

RIBBONS: remember the term "Tanglers", well, ribbons are tanglers and end up wrapping around the shafts/discs at the recycling facility. Tanglers, like plastic bags, twine, or anything else long and stringy can shut down your recycling plant.

CHRISTMAS CARDS: Most are OK but not shiny, glittery, metallic or those printed on photo paper. You can safely recycle the paper portions (back part of card) and most envelopes.

SHIPPING BOXES: Cardboard boxes are great to recycle and, because of on-line shopping, are in abundance. However, the packing materials: plastic air pillows, bubble wrap, plastic bags/wrap must go into the trash

TISSUE PAPER: Found two different thoughts about recycling tissue paper- one thought: definitely NO because most tissue paper is already recycled paper, therefore fibers are already shortened to a point it cannot be recycled again. Others say tissue paper is OK- guess that choice is up to you.

WHAT CAN WE DO TO HELP? (1) Reuse gift bags, ribbons and bows (2) Use less tape and sticky stuff when wrapping (3) Use old comics, maps or other paper materials to wrap (4) Use non-laminated paper or even refold used paper (remember Mom saying "save the paper")?

Follow the rule: it is better to reuse or not use at all! HAPPY AND GREEN RECYCLABLE NEW YEAR

NH MD 44 Lions Charities, Inc. By MCC Fred Plett

I forgot my typical MCC report for this much lengthier but very important article on a new possible organization. At Midwinter Convention, all Lions present will be asked to approve Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws for a NH MD 44 Lions Charities, Inc. What is this, and why is its formation being proposed?

For the last couple of years, Multiple District 44 has been asked to create a new 501(C) (3) organization. The thought was to be able to solicit donations from businesses for new hearing and eye screeners for Health Services of New Hampshire, and for other charitable purposes for the Multiple District. It hadn't been done, and at the July 2019 Multiple Council I asked if this was still the desire of the Multiple District Leadership, and I got an affirmative response.

We researched and found an existing Connecticut Lions Charities, Inc. We reached out through PDG Allen O'Farrell of District 23 C in CT, who put MCC Fred in touch with Lion and Attorney Syd Schulman of Schulman Law, in Hartford, who is responsible for their organization, and who was kind enough to provide their Certificate of Incorporation and By-Laws, to use as a template for what will be presented to you at Mid -Winter. He also answered many questions. The proposed wording we came up with has been translated into a New Hampshire Law friendly version with the help of many eagle eyes, and especially with the help of Lion Chris Seufert of Seufert Law in Franklin - thank you, Chris! The wording is in the hands of Uniforms -Resolutions Chair Joe Kasper and he will distribute to you these documents at least 45 days before the January 24-26th Midwinter Convention at the Doubletree by Hilton in Nashua. As we conversed with CT, and with VT at New England Lions Council meetings, we learned that their organizations serve as a superstructure 501(C)(3) organization for CT Multiple District 23 and for VT District 45, so that clubs who are not 501 (C)(3)'s and who wish to undergo capital campaigns, and solicit businesses, can do so by informing and getting buy-in from their Charities Inc. equivalents to our proposed organization, raising funds for their charitable causes, with funds going to the charitable organizations, and with sufficient funds raised, writing a grant request to the charitable organization, which will in turn cut a check to the club for their charitable purpose. The charities organization will request proof of purchase and results for this charitable endeavor, and the project is so ended.

We see this new organization as serving a dual purpose, as a fundraiser mechanism for multiple district projects and also a vehicle for clubs in the Multiple District who are not 501(C)(3)'s to take advantage of a parent organization that is a 501(C)(3).

We foresee some changes if this passes, but only with discussion and buy-in from all affected parties. DogSight now funnels through the special purpose Lions Sight and Hearing Foundation. Funneling through NH MD 44 Charities, Inc., would be a more logical choice because this new organization would be general purpose for the multiple district. Funds now held in an equipment account for Health Services New Hampshire would instead be held in this new organization. The purpose is the same, and Health Services New

organization. Other changes could unfold as this organization moves forward, if you approve it. One question received is whether funds could be moved from one purpose to another (who moved my cheese?), and the answer is yes, but with great difficulty. It would require written approval from all donors, notice to all affected entities, and a 2/3 vote of the directors. Since there are nine proposed directors, 2/3 is six out of nine.

Three of the Directors will be the Multiple Council Chair and the two District Governors. The remaining 6 would be 3 from 44H, 3 from 44N to the extent possible, with terms of 1, 2 and 3 years initially, so election of the directors will occur annually at midwinter convention, one from 44H and one from 44N, if possible. The two District Governors would initially appoint 3 from each District, and this would be followed every year thereafter by election. The Multiple Council Chair would be President of this new organization. The directors would then elect from among themselves a Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. They could choose to reach outside of themselves for help in these positions. They would meet at the same time as Multiple Council meetings, and at other times as needed.

There are administrative costs to the Multiple District to get this new organization going. There are filing fees with the State of New Hampshire, both with the Secretary of State (NP-1 - \$25) and with the Department of Justice (NHCT-1, \$25), and a filing fee with the IRS (this was changed in 2018 to a flat \$600 regardless of future income expectations – there is currently \$600 set aside in the MD 44 budget). There is the cost of a PO Box (\$106 per year for the smallest available) for the new organization. And there may be costs for creation of promotional material. There are ongoing fees with the State of NH for annual reports (\$75 per year) and for a \$75 five year




